ODFW Fishing Report (As of June 5th)

- Spring Chinook fishing on the North Coast remains fair in the estuaries with fish being caught consistently in Tillamook and Nestucca bays. A few fish are being caught upriver as well but the low flows have the majority stacking up in tidewater. Tillamook Bay, the Nestucca estuary (Pacific City), Trask River, Nestucca River, and the lower Columbia tributaries (Big Cr., Gnat Cr., and Klaskanine R.) will provide the best opportunities for encountering springers.
- Summer steelhead runs are going on the Nestucca and Wilson Rivers and should continue to improve through June. Effort has been light, and

conditions are challenging but there should be fish in both basins.

- North Coast lakes will be getting their final stocking of the spring this week. The fish look good this year and are a great size for catching and eating! Lake Lytle is getting weedy, and water quality is dropping off at Loren's Pond. There will be trout available most of the summer, but fishing will get more challenging as the water warms up. Fishing early morning and late evening and targeting higher elevation lakes that stay cooler will up the odds of success.
- The North Jetty of Tillamook Bay (accessible through Barview County Park) provides some good angling opportunity for rockfish, kelp greenling, and ling cod this time of year.
- Many North Coast rivers and streams opened to trout fishing on May 22nd (check the regulations for open areas and bait restrictions). There are coastal cutthroat trout in all open areas, and sea-run cutthroat will start showing up in the tidewater in June and July and be throughout the rivers by late July and August.
- Warm water fisheries are picking up as water temperatures rise and spring spawning starts. Cape Meares Lake, Lake Lytle, Coffenbury Lake, Cullaby Lake, and Vernonia Pond all have largemouth bass and other sunfish species to target.
- Summer steelhead are showing up in the Siletz, it's still slow but a few fish are around.
- Olalla Reservoir is closed for the summer due to some timber management activities around the lake. Fish that were destined for Olalla Res. are being re-allocated to Big Cr. Res. near Newport.
- Lakes up and down the Mid Coast are being stocked per the stocking schedule. Check the stocking schedule for an up-to-date look at recently stocked lakes!
- If you're striking out on the rivers, the Mid Coast beaches offer some great opportunity for surfperch and other near shore species and clamping as well.

SUMMER SEASON (June 16-July 31)

For the summer season, retention of jack hatchery Chinook and hatchery steelhead will be open starting June 16 from the Astoria-Megler Bridge upstream to the Highway 395 Bridge in Pasco, WA. Due to the low summer Chinook forecast of 38,000 adults and allocation guidance, adult Chinook retention will be closed in summer season fisheries downstream of Priest Rapids Dam.

The sockeye return is forecasted to be 350,200 fish, which is down from last year's record return of more than 760,000 Columbia River sockeye but still provides room for a couple weeks of fishing. Retention of sockeye will be allowed June 22-July 6; all sockeye are considered adults in the bag limit. When open to sockeye retention, the daily adult bag limit is two salmon/steelhead, but only one may be a hatchery steelhead and only one may be a sockeye. When sockeye retention is closed during the summer season, the daily adult bag limit is one hatchery steelhead. Anglers must stop fishing for jack salmon after taking a daily limit of adult salmon or steelhead.

ALSEA RIVER: Cutthroat

The Alsea River closed to steelhead on April 30. Fishing for cutthroat trout opened on May 22. Cutthroat will be distributed throughout the Alsea basin. Anglers are reminded to check the regulations for use of bait and whether there are closed streams. *Last updated 5/27/25.*

NESTUCCA BASIN (Nestucca, Three Rivers, and Little Nestucca): salmon, steelhead, cutthroat

The Nestucca gets a run of hatchery spring Chinook and there have been some fish getting caught mostly down in the estuary near Pacific City. There have also been a few caught upriver and Cedar Creek hatchery recycled a few last week but with the Nestucca being so low most fish will be stacking up in the bay. Trolling herring or fishing plugs from anchor are effective techniques in the lower estuary, while further upstream bobber fishing bait is a go-to technique.

The Little Nestucca also gets a release of hatchery spring Chinook which should be returning. Pressure is often light on this sub basin as the majority of fish are in the main Nestucca, but anglers willing to put some time in should be able to find fish.

There is also a run of hatchery summer steelhead in the Nestucca and a few have returned to the adult trap at Cedar Creek hatchery (1 was recycled last week and a few showed up at the trap), indicating there are some in the river. The best fishing will be in the lower river from Cloverdale to Three Rivers during the early season. Light float fishing set ups with terminal baits like beads, jigs or small natural baits, as well as casting spoons or spinners can be effective. Early morning and late evening will be the best times to fish, although if there's good cloud cover or a little rain fish may stay on the bite more of the day.

Trout season opened in the Nestucca and Little Nestucca on May 22nd. The low clear water can make fishing a little challenging, but cutthroat are aggressive biters so use light line and stealthy tactics, concentrate on deep pools with cover, and you should find success. Many areas have bait restrictions in place so check the regulations for those and open areas before heading out.

SILETZ RIVER: chinook, steelhead, cutthroat

Spring Chinook fishing has begun on the Siletz. There have had a few reports of fish being caught lower in the system but it is still slow.

Summer steelhead have been reported in the catch. Angling should improve over the next month as these fish push to the gorge. Bank angling in the gorge is best from late June through July. If stream flows allow, the float from Moonshine Park to Siletz can be productive.

Cutthroat trout fishing opened on May 22. Cutthroat will be distributed throughout the Siletz basin. Anglers are reminded to check the regulations for use of bait and whether there are closed streams. *Last updated 5/27/25.*

WILSON RIVER: steelhead, trout

The Wilson gets a run of hatchery summer steelhead and a few have started entering the river and are probably spread throughout the lower basin, but low clear water will make catching them a challenge. For those anglers set on getting an early summer, fish early morning and cover lots of water including deep holes, pocket water, and drifts with some chop to them. Light line, subtle terminal presentations like beads, jigs, or small natural baits and hardware like spinners and spoons should all produce fish. There are no spring Chinook releases on the Wilson.

Trout season opened on the Wilson on May 22nd. The Wilson tends to be a little slower for coastal cutthroat trout than some of the neighboring basins, but there are trout throughout the fishery and lots of public access off of Hwy 6. The low clear water can make fishing a little challenging, but cutthroat are aggressive biters so use light line and stealthy tactics, concentrate on deep pools with cover, and you should find success. Many areas have bait restrictions in place so check the regulations for those and open areas before heading out. *Last updated 6/4/25.* Wilson River levels and predictions are available [here](#).

DETROIT RESERVOIR: trout

The reservoir is now completely full, just in time for the busy recreation season. All boat ramps are available including Mongold. Pretty much any technique will catch fish, but it might take some experimenting to find out what is most effective on the day you're out there. For those anglers without a boat, there are recreation areas in both upper arms of the reservoir that allow for easy bank angling.

The reservoir gets stocked with trout during the late spring and summer. It will be stocked this week with about 6,000 trophy sized hatchery trout. As a reminder, anglers are allowed to keep up to five trout, with an additional five fish kokanee bag limit. Anglers are reporting good success lately. Also, as a reminder to anglers, fishing for and harvesting Chinook in the lake and the rivers above is prohibited. Any Chinook caught in Detroit must be released unharmed. Make sure you can tell the difference between a Chinook and a kokanee before you get out on the water.

It's always a good idea to check the water levels at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers website before using the boat ramps. For the latest information on water levels at Detroit Reservoir check with the Army Corps of Engineers' [website for more information](#). Anglers are encouraged to report their catch on an [on-line form](#). Remember to indicate whether the fish you catch have their adipose fin or not. This information will allow ODFW to manage the fishery for the benefit of both recreational anglers and the resource. *Last updated 6/2/25.*

SANTIAM RIVER (NORTH FORK): Salmon, steelhead

River levels best for fishing are at or below 3,000 cfs, and the river is currently running around 1,400 cfs at the gage in Mahama. Both the summer steelhead and spring chinook runs are in full swing. About 2,600 summer steelhead have passed above Willamette Falls as of May 29. Hundreds of adult spring chinook are navigating the ladder at Willamette Falls every day. Counts at the falls are

over 14,000 adults so far. Some of these fish have already arrived in the North Santiam basin with more arriving every day. There are several large, downed trees in the river creating some dangerous hazards for boaters in the lower river. For more information check out the Oregon State Marine Board website. *Updated 6/2/25.*

SANTIAM RIVER (SOUTH FORK): steelhead, bass, trout,

Fishing is generally best when flows are below 3,000 cfs. Flows are currently around 1,200 cfs at the gage in Waterloo. Counts of newly arrived summer steelhead and spring chinook have started to take off at Willamette Falls, and many of them have already moved into the basin. About 14,000 adult chinook have been counted at Willamette Falls so far, with many more on the way. Fish can be found throughout river, including at Lebanon, Waterloo and below the deadline at Wiley Creek Park.

WALLING POND: trout, panfish

This eight-acre privately-owned pond has been **closed** since 11/8/23. No stocking scheduled due to potential changes in public access.

WALTER WIRTH LAKE: trout, bass, panfish.

This urban lake usually gets stocked from about Thanksgiving through May. The rest of the year anglers can target bluegill and bass. It was recently stocked with 2,500 trout. Due to high water temperatures, this week's trout stocking was cancelled. It will not be stocked again until the winter. Walter Wirth is a 20-acre lake located within the City of Salem's Cascades Gateway Park with good access all the way around. *Last updated 5/27/25.*

Smallmouth bass can be a lot of fun to catch and are plentiful between Salem and Corvallis during the spring and summer. Trout prefer the cooler temperatures upstream of Corvallis. From Salem downstream there are plenty of largemouth bass in the deeper, quieter sections. *Last updated 6/2/25.*

OCEAN:

HALIBUT- Spring all-depth- Remaining lbs: 156,492; Remaining %:75%

Ocean and weather conditions were less than ideal last week, providing only a few good fishable days.

Depoe Bay: Only a few anglers fished last with an average of 0.33 fish per angler.

Newport: Fishing was good last week with just over 1.25 fish per angler.

Charleston: Effort was low, and no halibut were observed dockside.

Brookings: Some fish were landed with a catch rate of 0.25 fish per angler.

SALMON- The **mark-selective coho fishery** from **Cape Falcon to the Oregon/California border** opened Saturday, June 7. Minimum size limits of 24" for Chinook (where allowed), 16" for coho, and 20" for steelhead

Starting Saturday, June 7:

- In the area from **Cape Falcon to Humbug Mountain** the daily bag limit is two salmon, but no more than one Chinook, and all retained coho must have a healed adipose fin-clip.
- From **Humbug Mountain to the Oregon/California border** the daily bag limit is two salmon except closed to Chinook retention, and all retained coho must have a healed adipose fin-clip.

BOTTOMFISH-

Port by port reports:

Garibaldi: Anglers landed around 3 rockfish on average, with a mix of black, yellowtail and deacon rockfishes. Lingcod was slow, with average of 0.5 fish per angler.

Depoe Bay: Anglers saw decent landings of 2.5 rockfish per angler on average, mostly black rockfish. Lingcod fishing was slow.

Newport: Anglers landed close to 3 rockfish each, mainly black rockfish. Lingcod landings were around 0.33 fish per angler.

Charleston: Anglers landed close to 4 rockfish, with mostly black and yellowtail rockfishes. Lingcod was slower at about 0.5 fish per angler.

Brookings: Landings were about 3 rockfish each. Mostly black and canary rockfishes were landed. Lingcod landings were around 0.5 fish per angler.

DUNGENESS CRAB- OPEN- Crabbing in Waldport has improved to fair, while Newport is still slow. When there has been a lot of rain, crabbing in bays is typically not good since the surge of fresh water from the rivers forces the crab to retreat to the saltier water of the ocean.

RAZOR CLAMS

- OPEN from the WA border to Cape Blanco.
- CLOSED from Cape Blanco to the CA border.

MUSSELS and BAY CLAMS are OPEN.

EUROPEAN GREEN CRAB- OPEN- This invasive species now has a limit of 35 per day to encourage harvest. While they look like Oregon's native shore crabs, they have three prominent bumps between the eyes and 5 spines down the side of the carapace.

Seal and Sea Lion Reporter: The Seal and Sea Lion Reporter is an ESRI Survey123 form that can be used by anyone to report pinniped sightings to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW) Marine Mammal Program. Sightings can be reported using either a web browser or a mobile app, real-time or after-the-fact, and in the field or back at one's home or office. This crowd-sourced data will be used to identify potential pinniped "hot spots" in the basin for future research or management. Note that no personal information is asked for or collected by the form and there are no usernames or passwords needed. The form is quite easy to use, and hopefully self-explanatory, but detailed instructions are given below for reference. For more information contact bryan.e.wright@odfw.oregon.gov. 7. Show gratitude and offer to provide financial assistance for fuel, bait, etc.





