ODFW Fishing Report (As of Aug 12th)

- August 1st officially started the Fall Chinook Season on the Tillamook, Nestucca, and Necanicum basins. It is really early and there won't be many Fall Chinook until mid-September. All of these basins have reduced bag limits for wild fall Chinook this season so check the regulation updates online before heading out.
- Summer steelhead fishing has been picking up on the Nestucca and Wilson Rivers. Summers are throughout the fisheries and there have been an increasing number getting caught. Cedar Creek hatchery

- on the Nestucca has recycled a few as well.
- Nehalem gets a run of Fall Chinook that starts in July, and those fish are in the bay. There have been fish getting caught from the jaws up past Wheeler. The wild adult Chinook bag limit is 1/day and 2/season as part of the daily bag limit on the Nehalem. See the regulation updates online for more details.
- North Coast lakes trout stocking has been completed. The next stocking will be in September.. There will be trout available most of the summer, but fishing will get more challenging as the water warms up. Fishing early morning and late evening and targeting higher elevation lakes that stay cooler will up the odds of success.
- The North Jetty of Tillamook Bay (accessible through Barview County Park) provides some good angling opportunity for rockfish and kelp greenling this time of year.
- There are coastal cutthroat trout in all open areas, and sea-run cutthroat are in tidewater and should be starting to migrate into the rivers.
- Warm water fisheries are going and should be decent through the summer and into the early fall. Cape Meares Lake, Lake Lytle, Coffenbury Lake, Cullaby Lake, and Vernonia Pond all have largemouth bass and other sunfish species to target. Many of the lakes that have these species tend to get weedy in the summer; using weedless rigs will up the odds of success (and lower frustration and gear loss).
- Fall Chinook is finally back open on the Midcoast! August 1st is the opener for Fall Chinook on the Salmon, Siletz, Yaquina, Alsea, Yachats, and Siuslaw! Like its North Coast neighbors fishing has only just begun and wont really pick up until September.
- As we move through the end of the summer months and water and air temperatures stay high, please be mindful of catch and release techniques! Keep fish in the water as much as possible and

- ensure proper release techniques are used!
- We have recycled a few hatchery summer steelhead into the fishery and will continue to do so as temperatures allow! Olalla Reservoir is closed for the summer due to some timber management activities around the lake. Fish that were destined for Olalla Res. are being re-allocated to Big Cr. Res. near Newport.
- Mid Coast beaches offer some great opportunity for surfperch and other near shore species and clamping as well. Check out this link for more information on clamping during the minus tides.
- Olalla Reservoir is closed for the summer due to some timber management activities around the lake. Fish that were destined for Olalla Res. are being re-allocated to Big Cr. Res. near Newport.
- Lakes up and down the Mid Coast are being stocked per the stocking schedule. Check the stocking schedule for an up-to-date look at recently stocked lakes!
- If you're striking out on the rivers, the Mid Coast beaches offer some great opportunity for surfperch and other near shore species and clamping as well.
- The Willamette River and other water bodies are increasing in activity.
- Several waterbodies will be stocked with trout this week.
- Cascade Hike-in Lakes offer beauty, serenity, and the potential for untrammelled fishing opportunities.
- Columbia River regulation updates for the summer management period (June 16-July 31) and fall

management period (August 1- December 31) are posted. Please see the [fishing regulation update page](#) for details.

- Angling for summer steelhead has been good below Bonneville.
- On Saturday's (8/2) flight, there were 188 boats and 84 Oregon bank anglers from Bonneville down to the Astoria-Megler Bridge.
- Gorge: Weekly checking showed one jack Chinook released for three boats (seven anglers); and one Chinook and 13 steelhead kept, and 37 steelhead released for 118 bank anglers.
- Troutdale: Weekly checking showed eight Chinook and two steelhead kept, and one Chinook, one jack Chinook, and two steelhead released for 44 boats (82 anglers).
- Portland to Warrior Rock: Weekly checking showed one Chinook and two steelhead kept, and one steelhead released for eight boats (15 anglers); and no catch for three bank anglers.
- Warrior Rock to Rainier: Weekly checking showed 15 Chinook, one jack Chinook, and 10 steelhead kept, and three Chinook, seven jack Chinook, and eight steelhead released for 83 boats (188 anglers); and one steelhead kept, and one steelhead released for 20 bank anglers.
- Rainier to Lower Puget Island: Weekly checking showed one steelhead kept, and one steelhead released for two boats (five anglers); and no catch for 15 bank anglers.
- Lower Puget Island to Tongue Point/Rocky Point: No report.
- Buoy 10: Weekly checking showed 317 Chinook, 10 coho, and four steelhead kept, and 51 Chinook, nine coho, and one steelhead released for 306 boats (1,047 anglers).

ALSEA RIVER: Salmon, Cutthroat

Fall Chinook is finally back open on the coast! It is still early in the season, but there are likely a few fish around the bay at this time. We haven't had any reports of fish in the Alsea yet but it is still early in the season. Alsea bay does provide excellent clamming

Coastal Cutthroat will be distributed throughout the Alsea basin and provide an excellent and fun opportunity during the summer months. As we move into August cutthroat will continue moving throughout the basin more and more. With the lower waters, hitting the river in the early mornings before temperatures rise can be a good bet for landing cutthroat in the basin! Anglers are reminded to check the regulations for use of bait and whether there are closed streams. *Last updated 7/30/25.*

NESTUCCA BASIN (Nestucca, Three Rivers, and Little Nestucca): salmon, steelhead, cutthroat August 1st is the official start of Fall Chinook season, but there won't be many around this early, and probably won't be any above tidewater until the fall rains. The wild adult fall Chinook bag limit is 1 per day and 5 per season in the Nestucca basin as part of the overall daily bag limit. See the regulation updates online for more details.

Summer steelhead continue to return to the Nestucca River and are throughout the fishery (up to Elk Creek). Fishing seems to have picked up with some fish being caught consistently. Cedar Creek hatchery recycled 17 back to Pacific City, to add additional angler opportunity, last week. Light float fishing set ups with terminal baits like beads, jigs or small natural baits, as well as casting spoons or spinners can be effective. Early morning and late evening will be the best times to fish, although if there's good cloud cover or a little rain fish may stay on the bite more of the day.

There are resident cutthroat throughout the fishery and sea-run cutthroat should be moving into the river as well. Many areas have bait restrictions in place so check the regulations for those and open areas before heading out.

SILETZ RIVER: chinook, steelhead, cutthroat

There are a handful of bank angling spots within the fishery, but if you are targeting summer steelhead, reminder to check your regulations on where Chinook fishery closes. If you do happen to hook into a migrating Fall Chinook outside of the retention fishery, please follow safe handling techniques as we endure higher summer temperatures.

Summer steelhead have been reported in the catch. Angling should improve over the next month as these fish push to the gorge. Bank angling in the gorge is best from late June through July. If stream flows allow the float from Moonshine Park to Siletz can be productive as well! We saw more hatchery summers move into the basin in July, but numbers were low given the low river levels and high temps. The Siletz does have hatchery steelhead providing additional harvest opportunity!

Cutthroat will be distributed throughout the Siletz basin. Anglers are reminded to check the regulations for the use of bait and whether there are closed streams. *Last updated 07/28/25.*

WILSON RIVER: steelhead, trout

The Wilson gets a run of hatchery summer steelhead. There are fish throughout the fishery (up to South Fork). Reports from the Wilson have been scarce, but given the recent improved fishing on other basins, I would expect the same for the Wilson. The upper river below the South Fork will probably hold the best numbers of fish this time of year. For summer steelhead, fish early in the morning and cover lots of water including deep holes, pocket water, and drifts with some chop to them. Light line, subtle terminal presentations like beads, jigs, or small natural baits and hardware like spinners and spoons should all produce fish. There are no spring Chinook releases on the Wilson.

The Wilson tends to be a little slower for coastal cutthroat trout than some of the neighboring basins, but there are resident trout throughout the fishery and lots of public access off of Hwy 6. Sea-run cutthroat should be showing up in the river as well.

DETROIT RESERVOIR: trout

Water elevation is dropping from ever-decreasing inflows and evaporation. Most boat ramps are still in the water, however. Pretty much any technique will catch fish, but it might take some experimenting to find out what is most effective on the day you're out there. For those anglers without a boat, there are recreation areas in both upper arms of the reservoir that allow for easy bank angling.

The reservoir gets stocked with trout during the late spring and summer. It was stocked most recently with about 4,000 trophy-sized hatchery trout. As a reminder, anglers are allowed to keep up to five trout, with an additional five fish kokanee bag limit.

It's always a good idea to check the water levels at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers website before

using the boat ramps. For the latest information on water levels at Detroit Reservoir check with the Army Corps of Engineers' [website for more information](#).

Last updated 8/4/25.

Also, as a reminder to anglers, fishing for and harvesting Chinook in the lake and the rivers above is prohibited. Any Chinook caught in Detroit must be released unharmed. Make sure you can tell the difference between a Chinook and a kokanee before you get out on the water.

Anglers are encouraged to report their catch on an [on-line form](#). Remember to indicate whether the fish you catch have their adipose fin or not. This information will allow ODFW to manage the fishery for the benefit of both recreational anglers and the resource.

SANTIAM RIVER (NORTH FORK): Salmon, steelhead

River levels best for fishing are at or below 3,000 cfs, and the river is currently running at around 1,000 cfs at the gage in Mahama. The spring chinook run for the Upper Willamette is complete and at this point all the adults are in their spawning tributaries. Most of these fish are above Stayton, but a few stragglers can be found in downstream sections. The summer steelhead run is also complete for the most part. About 4,500 summer steelhead and over 30,000 spring chinook have passed above Willamette Falls as of July 31. A bobber and jig set-up or drifting a cluster of salmon eggs is the usual technique, but flies and spinning lures will work as well, depending on flow conditions.

There are several large, downed trees in the river creating some dangerous hazards for boaters in the lower river. For more information check out the [Oregon State Marine Board website](#).

Fishing for steelhead is open year-round, but the use of bait is not allowed between Nov. 1 and April 21. *Last updated 8/4/25.*

SANTIAM RIVER (SOUTH FORK): steelhead, bass, trout,

Fishing is generally best when flows are below 3,000 cfs. Now that the dry season has arrived, flows are being consistently held at around 840 cfs at the gage in Waterloo. The spring chinook run is now complete and the summer steelhead run nearly so. About 30,000 adult chinook and 4,500 summer steelhead have been counted at Willamette Falls so far. About 700 summer steelhead and over 2,500 spring chinook have entered the ladder at Foster Dam. Fish can be found throughout river, including at Lebanon, Waterloo, and below the deadline at Wiley Creek Park. *Last updated 8/4/25.*

WALLING POND: trout, panfish

This eight-acre privately-owned pond has been **closed** since 11/8/23. No stocking scheduled due to potential changes in public access.

WALTER WIRTH LAKE: trout, bass, panfish.

This urban lake usually gets stocked from about Thanksgiving through May. The rest of the year anglers can target bluegill and bass. It was recently stocked with 2,500 trout. Due to high water temperatures, this week's trout stocking was cancelled. It will not be stocked again until the winter. Walter Wirth is a 20-acre lake located within the City of Salem's Cascades Gateway Park with good access all the way around. *Last updated 5/27/25.*

WILLAMETTE RIVER: sturgeon, steelhead, spring Chinook, coho, small and largemouth bass

Smallmouth bass can be a lot of fun to catch and are plentiful between Salem and Corvallis during the spring and summer. Trout prefer the cooler temperatures upstream of Corvallis. From Salem downstream there are plenty of largemouth bass in the deeper, quieter sections. *Last updated 8/9/25.*

OCEAN:

HALIBUT- The **Columbia River subarea** spring all-depth halibut season closed effective July 1, though nearshore halibut fishing will remain open Mondays through Wednesdays. The all-depth fishery may reopen in August and/or September if quota remains [QUOTA REMAINS].

The **Central Oregon Coast and Southern Oregon subareas** are open daily at all-depth.

SALMON- The **mark-selective coho fishery from Cape Falcon to the Oregon/California border** opened Saturday, June 7. Minimum size limits of 24" for Chinook (where allowed), 16" for coho, and 20" for steelhead

Starting Saturday, June 7:

- In the area from **Cape Falcon to Humbug Mountain** the daily bag limit is two salmon, but no more than one Chinook, and all retained coho must have a healed adipose fin-clip.
- From **Humbug Mountain to the Oregon/California border** the daily bag limit is two salmon except closed to Chinook retention, and all retained coho must have a healed adipose fin-clip.

BOTTOMFISH-

- **Garibaldi**: Anglers landed an average of 3 rockfish per angler; mostly black, canary and yellowtail rockfishes. Lingcod landings averaged just above 0.5 fish per angler.
- **Depoe Bay**: Anglers brought in an average of 3 rockfish per angler. Landings consisted of mostly black, canary and deacon rockfishes. Lingcod fishing was slow.
- **Newport**: Anglers landed an average of 3.5 rockfish each; mainly black and deacon rockfishes. Lingcod landings were slow with around 0.25 fish per angler on average.
- **Charleston**: Fishing was good with 4 rockfish on average; mostly black and yellowtail rockfishes. Lingcod was slow.
- **Brookings**: Anglers brought in about 3.5 rockfish. Mostly black rockfish were landed. Lingcod landings were around 0.5 fish per angler.
- **Garibaldi**: Effort was low for halibut last week but anglers brought in an average of 1 fish.
- **Depoe Bay**: Only a few anglers targeted halibut last week, and no fish were observed dockside.
- **Newport**: Fishing was slower with around 0.75 fish per angler.
- **Charleston**: Anglers had limited success with only a few fish observed in port.
- **Brookings**: Very few fish were observed dockside.

Albacore Tuna

Good ocean conditions much of the July 28 to August 3 week saw continued effort for albacore tuna. The highest observed catch rates were in Pacific City, Newport, and Garibaldi with 11.0, 4.8, and 4.37 albacore per angler, respectively.

DUNGENESS CRAB- OPEN- Crabbing in **Newport** and **Walport** has been fair. There is a mix of soft and hard crabs.

RAZOR CLAMS

- OPEN from the Tillamook Head to Cape Blanco.
- CLOSED from WA border to Tillamook Head AND Cape Blanco to the CA border.

MUSSELS are CLOSED from Cape Blanco to CA border, OPEN everywhere else.

Bay Clams are OPEN

EUROPEAN GREEN CRAB- OPEN- This invasive species now has a limit of 35 per day to encourage harvest. While they look like Oregon's native shore crabs, they have three prominent bumps between the eyes and 5 spines down the side of the carapace.

Seal and Sea Lion Reporter: The Seal and Sea Lion Reporter is an ESRI Survey123 form that can be used by anyone to report pinniped sightings to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW) Marine Mammal Program. Sightings can be reported using either a web browser or a mobile app, real-time or after-the-fact, and in the field or back at one's home or office. This crowd-sourced data will be used to identify potential pinniped "hot spots" in the basin for future research or management. Note that no personal information is asked for or collected by the form and there are no usernames or passwords needed. The form is quite easy to use, and hopefully self-explanatory, but detailed instructions are given below for reference. For more information contact bryan.e.wright@odfw.oregon.gov. 


