ODFW Fishing Report (As of Nov 11th)

Northwest region

- Fall Chinook fishing was decent last week in the Nestucca, Trask, Wilson, Kilchis, and Nehalem Rivers before heavy rains blew them out over the weekend. The rivers are still high and off color and more rain is on the way. When they do drop back into shape fishing should be fair to good. Basins have reduced bag limits for wild fall Chinook this season so check the regulation updates online before heading out.
- The Trask River and North Fork Nehalem River are both getting hatchery coho coming in and fishing has been decent with some nice fish being caught. (There is no retention of wild coho allowed.)
- The catch and release fisheries for chum salmon should provide some fun opportunities on the Kilchis and Miami Rivers once the water levels come down.
- Summer steelhead are in the Nestucca and Wilson Rivers. While

many people turn to salmon fishing in the fall it can be a good time to target summer steelhead in the rivers as well. As water temperatures start to drop fish that have been holding all summer will often get more active.

- There are still hold over trout from last spring's stockings that are available to catch in some of the lakes. Hebo Lake, South Lake, Town Lake, Cape Meares Lake, Lake Tahoe, and Lost Lake should provide the best opportunity.
- Fall Chinook remains fair on most of our midcoast basins. The bite has gotten better as the season goes on, but by and large folks have been reporting some decent catch!
- Wild coho retention is continuing on a few of our Midcoast basins into November. Siletz, Yaquina and the Alsea rivers have seasons extending into November for additional opportunity! Check the stocking schedule for an up-to-date look at recently stocked lakes!

Columbia

SALMON, STEELHEAD AND SHAD

- Gorge: No report.
- Troutdale: Weekly checking showed no catch for three boats (six anglers).
- Portland to Warrior Rock: Weekly checking showed no catch for three boats (six anglers).
- Warrior Rock to Rainier: Weekly checking showed six coho kept, and two Chinook and two coho released for 10 boats (21 anglers).
- Rainier to Lower Puget Island: No report.
- Lower Puget Island to Tongue Point/Rocky Point: No report.
- Buoy 10: No report.
- Bonneville Pool (Bonneville Dam upstream to The Dalles Dam): Weekly checking showed 98 coho and one jack coho kept, and one Chinook, one jack chinook, six coho, and one steelhead released for 24 boats (71 anglers).
- The Dalles Pool (The Dalles Dam upstream to John Day Dam): No report.

- John Day Pool (Columbia River above John Day Dam and John Day Arm): No report.

Sturgeon

- Lower Columbia River (below Bonneville Dam): Closed to retention. Weekly checking showed four sub-legal sized sturgeon, 18 legal sized sturgeon, and six over-legal sized sturgeon released for two boats (five anglers).
- Bonneville Pool: Closed to retention. No report.
- The Dalles Pool: Closed to retention. Weekly checking showed seven sub-legal sized sturgeon, six legal sized sturgeon, and three over-legal sized sturgeon released for one boat (two anglers).
- John Day Pool: Weekly checking showed one sub-legal sized sturgeon, one legal sized sturgeon, and five

over-legal sized sturgeon for one boat (two anglers).

Walleye

- Lower Columbia River (below Bonneville Dam): No report.
- Bonneville Pool: Weekly checking showed no catch for two boats (two anglers).
- The Dalles Pool: Weekly checking showed 17 walleye kept for five boats (10 anglers); and no catch for one bank angler.
- John Day Pool: Weekly checking showed 11 walleye kept, and two walleye released for two boats (two anglers).

Willamette region

- The Willamette River and other water bodies are increasing in activity.
- Several waterbodies will be stocked with trout this week.
- Cascade Hike-in Lakes offer beauty, serenity, and the potential for untrammelled fishing opportunities.

ALSEA RIVER: Fall Chinook, coho, hatchery winter steelhead

Fish are still coming into the Alsea Basin making the catch fair. With rain in the forecast, we will likely see more fish being caught! **The Alsea wild coho retention reopened October 25.**

Fall Chinook is open on the Alsea but has been a slower start to the season. Fish are around the lower bay and are moving further up into the basin with the recent rains. Overall, the bite is fair, but we should see more fish being caught moving into this weekend after even more rain!

November 1st hatchery steelhead opened on the Alsea River. Though its early in the season it isn't unheard of to catch an early winter steelhead this time of year.

Last updated 11/03/25.

NESTUCCA BASIN (Nestucca, Three Rivers, and Little Nestucca): salmon, steelhead, cutthroat
No retention of wild coho allowed. The wild coho fishery closed on October 27.

The Nestucca River blew out over the weekend following heavy rains. With more rain on the way it will probably stay high and off color through the weekend. When it does drop back into shape there should be Fall Chinook throughout the fishery (up to 1st bridge). The wild adult fall Chinook bag limit is 1 per day and 5 per season in the Nestucca basin as part of the overall daily bag limit. See the regulation updates online for more details.

Summer steelhead are throughout the Nestucca River fishery (up to Elk Creek). Fall can be a good time to target these fish as dropping water temperatures can make them more active and willing to bite.

Cutthroat trout season closed November1. *Last updated 11/3/25.*

SILETZ RIVER: chinook, steelhead

Fall Chinook continues to be fair on the Siletz! After a slower start fishing has really picked up in the past few weeks with the recent rains we have seen. Fish are still moving throughout tidewater, and catch will likely increase given the cooler temperatures. The mouth of the Siletz near Taft also offers some bank access for throwing spinners on incoming fish this time of year though reports at the mouth have slowed down. More fish are entering the system and folks have been catching as high up as Jack Morgan and Strome.

You can troll for coho in the lower Siletz Bay. Coho are certainly rolling around the lower Siletz now, though the overall catch has remained fair. The coho fishery will remain open though some of its midcoastal neighbors will close for a few weeks. Remember to check your regulations before heading out!

Although most folks switch to salmon in the fall, summer steelhead are still throughout the upper gorge. Hatchery fish are still being caught in the gorge which offers a lot of unique bank angling opportunities this time of year!

WILSON RIVER: Chinook, steelhead

No retention of wild coho is allowed.

The Wilson River blew out over the weekend going to action stage and with more rain on the way it may be high and off color for the weekend. Once it does drop back into shape, there should be good opportunity for Fall Chinook throughout the fishery. Jordan Creek is the upstream deadline for Chinook angling. The bag limit is 1 wild adult Chinook per day and 2 for the season in the Tillamook basin in aggregate.

The Wilson gets a run of hatchery summer steelhead. There are fish throughout the fishery (up to South Fork). Fall can be a good time of year to target these fish as the dropping water temperatures can make them more active and willing to bite. *Last updated 11/3/25.*

DETROIT RESERVOIR: trout

Water elevation continues to drop to provide for winter storage capacity. The only usable boat ramp is at Mongold State Park. The crowds are mostly gone this time of year, especially during the week, so anglers can find fish as well as solitude. Pretty much any technique will catch fish, but it might take some experimenting to find out what is most effective on the day you're out there. It was stocked most recently with about 4,000 trophy-sized hatchery trout. As a reminder, anglers are allowed to keep up to five trout, with an additional five fish kokanee bag limit.

It's always a good idea to check the water levels at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers website before using the boat ramps. For the latest information on water levels at Detroit Reservoir check with the Army Corps of Engineers' [website for more information](#). *Last updated 11/3/25.* Also, as a reminder to anglers, fishing for and harvesting Chinook in the lake and the rivers above is prohibited. Any Chinook caught in Detroit must be released unharmed. Make sure you can tell the difference between a Chinook and a kokanee before you get out on the water. Anglers are encouraged to report their catch on an [on-line form](#). Remember to indicate whether the fish you catch have their adipose fin or not. This information will allow ODFW to manage the fishery for the benefit of both recreational anglers and the resource.

SANTIAM RIVER (NORTH FORK): Salmon, steelhead

River levels best for fishing are at or below 3,000 cfs, and the river is currently running at around 3,100 cfs at the gage in Mehama. Over 26,000 coho salmon have migrated above Willamette Falls so far, a good proportion of them destined for the North Santiam. Recent warm rain has likely pushed most of these fish into the smaller tributaries, making them no longer accessible to anglers. However, there are more fish on their way from downstream. A bobber and jig set-up or drifting a cluster of eggs is the usual technique, but spin casting with lures or swinging large streamer flies through the pools can also work. Bait is prohibited from now through April 21. There are several large, downed trees in the river creating some dangerous hazards for boaters in the lower river. Fishing for steelhead is open year-round, but the use of bait is not allowed between Nov. 1 and April 21. *Last updated 11/03/25.*

SANTIAM RIVER (SOUTH FORK): steelhead, bass, trout,

Fishing is generally best when flows are below 3,000 cfs. Flows are currently at around 3,100 cfs at the gage in Waterloo. Fishing for spring Chinook is now closed. Fishing for summer steelhead is open year-round although there are few adults left in the basin. At this time of year, the majority of these are in the upper sections above Waterloo, from below the deadline at Wiley Creek to Pleasant Valley boat ramp. *Last updated 11/05/25.*

WALLING POND: trout, panfish

This eight-acre privately-owned pond has been **closed** since 11/8/23. No stocking scheduled due to potential changes in public access.

WALTER WIRTH LAKE: trout, bass, panfish.

This urban lake usually gets stocked from about Thanksgiving through May. The rest of the year anglers can target bluegill and bass. It will be stocked this week with 1,000 trout. Only one fish out a 5-fish bag limit may be longer than 20 inches. Walter Wirth is a 20-acre lake located within the City of Salem's Cascades Gateway Park with good access all the way around. *Last updated 11/05/25.*

Smallmouth bass can be a lot of fun to catch and are plentiful between Salem and Corvallis during the spring and summer. Trout prefer the cooler temperatures upstream of Corvallis. From Salem downstream there are plenty of largemouth bass in the deeper, quieter sections. *Last updated 8/26/25.*

HALIBUT- CLOSED

SALMON- CLOSED

BOTTOMFISH- Limit changed to 3 fish a day

Depoe Bay: A small number of boats went out. Catch was about 0.5 fish per angler of mostly black and blue rockfishes. Lingcod fishing was slow.

Newport: Only a couple of boats were able to fish last week. The average was just under 2 fish per angler. Mainly black and deacon rockfishes were caught. Lingcod fishing was slow.

Charleston: A few boats went out and caught just over 0.5 fish per angler of mainly black rockfish. No lingcod were observed.

Brookings: Only a couple of boats braved conditions last week, but they were rewarded with near limits of mostly black and canary rockfishes. Lingcod catch was about 0.5 fish per angler.

DUNGENESS CRAB- OPEN- Crabbing in **Newport** and **Walport** has been good. Crab quality is good as shells have hardened and are full of meat. Ocean CLOSED until Nov 30.

RAZOR CLAMS

- OPEN from WA border to Cape Blanco.
- CLOSED Cape Blanco to the CA border.

MUSSELS are OPEN everywhere.

Bay Clams are OPEN

EUROPEAN GREEN CRAB- OPEN- This invasive species now has a limit of 35 per day to encourage harvest. While they look like Oregon's native shore crabs, they have three prominent bumps between the eyes and 5 spines down the side of the carapace.

Seal and Sea Lion Reporter: The Seal and Sea Lion Reporter is an ESRI Survey123 form that can be used by anyone to report pinniped sightings to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW) Marine Mammal Program. Sightings can be reported using either a web browser or a mobile app, real-time or after-the-fact, and in the field or back at one's home or office. This crowd-sourced data will be used to identify potential pinniped "hot spots" in the basin for future research or management.

Note that no personal information is asked for or collected by the form and there are no usernames or passwords needed. The form is quite easy to use, and hopefully self-explanatory, but detailed instructions are given below for reference. For more information contact bryan.e.wright@odfw.oregon.gov. Download the app (**ArcGIS Survey123**) on your phone to submit.


